COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course aims to teach students from all majors how to grow vegetables, fruits, and herbs in a home garden. Basic principles of gardening and agriculture are presented in the lectures. Then, students apply these principles in their individual gardens.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Design and start their own garden after considering the resource requirements of the various plant species.
- Explain in general terms how seed sowing, transplanting, irrigation, fertilization, weed management, pest control, disease management, and crop timing work.
- Utilize these basic gardening skills/practices to successfully grow plants and harvest crops in their garden.

COURSE MATERIALS

Textbook

There is no required textbook for this course. However, UF/IFAS Extension has developed a multitude of publications to help gardeners and backyard growers. These publications are excellent reference materials for this course, and they are available for free here:

Slideshows

The slideshows presented in this class will be available on CANVAS. Discussions in class and hands-on work in the garden will add context to this material (focus on application of this information). Note that class attendance is required to earn points for work completed in the garden.

This course has a site in the CANVAS platform. The syllabus, handouts, lectures, and quizzes will be posted throughout the semester. New material will be added throughout the semester. You will be completing quizzes and uploading assignments into CANVAS.

COURSE ASSESSMENT COMPONENTS AND GRADING

1. Weekly Quizzes

36 points

Every Friday by midnight, a quiz will become available in CANVAS. This includes tomorrow. Each quiz will include up to 10 questions, be worth 3 points, and you will have 12 minutes to complete the quiz. Quizzes can only be taken once. Questions may be multiple choice, true or false, fill in the blank, or short answer. Quizzes will be available to take until the following Friday at midnight.

There are a total of 13 quizzes. Weekly quizzes can be taken even if a student misses the previous gardening session if approval of excuse is given by Dr. Merchant. A makeup quiz may be granted if a student has a justifiable excuse. Each student's lowest quiz score will be dropped at the end of the semester.

2. Garden 22 points

Each student will have their own garden plot in the field. Students are responsible for planning, planting, and maintaining their gardens. Students will be provided seeds, transplants, fertilizer, tools, and pest control implements throughout the semester. Although we may apply some water during classtime, irrigation will be automatic throughout the semester. However, you will be responsible for all other aspects of maintaining your garden. This garden will be your source of content for your blog (explained in next section), your semester long task (worth 22 points), and your source of bragging rights! We will use class time to demonstrate how to take care of your

garden, but you are encouraged to come throughout the week to work in it as much as you want. Your garden will be evaluated in the middle and at the end of the semester. Your attendance and participation quality will impact the points you earn.

3. Blog about Gardening and your garden 42 points

Students are responsible for designing, creating, and maintaining a gardening blog. Blogs must be publicly available (no password required). Your professor prefers the use of *wordpress*, *wix*, *or blogger.com* since other blogging networks are not as compatible with CANVAS. Each post is worth 3.5 points. Suggestion: Create a post each week to be sure to earn full credit. Each post must include 200-500 words and at least one multi-media item (picture, video, audio recording, etc.). Topic guidelines for posts will be provided by your professor during class, but please feel free to come up with your own. No blog post is required during Thanksgiving Break. You are expected to have at least 12 blogs.

How to setup blogs - For Assignment 3 you will create a blog using Blogger.com. The URL should contain blogspot.com. Be sure to make your blog "public" so Dr. Merchant can view it.
