Course Description and Requirements

Description: This introductory and survey course is intended for students with no background in tropical or subtropical fruits. The objective of the course is to provide basic information on several of the most important tropical and subtropical fruit crops from a worldwide and Florida perspective. Information will be provided on the origin, botany, cultivars, uses, and distribution of these important fruits. Some information will also be provided on cultural practices, diseases, pests, and postharvest handling.

Grading and Attendance Policies: The final grade will be determined from 3 in-class exams each worth 100 points (300 points total). There will also be 3 unannounced, in-class quizzes. In addition, each student is asked to give a 10-minute oral presentation on a tropical or subtropical crop not covered in class. A sign-up sheet will be passed around early in the semester. The quizzes and presentation will be factored into the final grade as extra credit. Class attendance and participation will also affect the final grade.

Final grades will be based on the performance of each student relative to the following standard percentages:
